

I've been thinking lately of the difference between nouns and verbs, which probably suggests to you that I'm still stuck in fourth grade. Actually, I've been thinking about *faith* and how in English *faith* is a noun, but how in Greek it can be a verb.

A verb provides the quality of action to our nouns. Shouldn't, then, faith be a verb, because *faith* is not a thing, it's an action? I find I cannot talk about faith in any way but dynamically. Faith is a process that grows and contracts, ebbs and flows, flourishes and withers as life proceeds. Dean Inge called faith "a kind of climbing instinct which draws us upward and onward." That sounds more like a trip than an arrival to me, more a journey than a map. Likewise, Harry Emerson Fosdick observed that "...faith is not a fortress, but a camp on the march; a camp, too, not of armed (soldiers), but of explorers."

"Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen," the New Testament's Letter to the Hebrews states. Assurance, conviction – these are words carrying heavy burdens of firmness and resoluteness and unshakability. Yet, look closely at this scriptural description of faith and the internal contradictions pop out starkly. Who needs to "hope" for things that are already assured? As for "conviction," that is something our minds generally consider positively proved. "The assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" is precisely the kind of tricky, elusive definition faith needs, for it is a surprising, slippery thing that cannot be contained in easy words.

Faith is an existential quality that is only possible to grasp by living it. No one knows what love is until one is loved and loves in return. No one knows pain until one suffers it. Faith is something no one thinks they have until they are forced to rely on it. Faith is a yet-to-be-built bridge over an abyss until the first step into the void is risked. And, to be clear, faith always shares space in our hearts with a sibling called "doubt." Assurances and convictions notwithstanding, Kahlil Gibran observed, "Doubt is a pain too lonely to know that faith is his twin brother."

How does faith arrive? "Faith is contagious," Ernest Gordon said. "It is passed on by men and women who have it burning in their hearts and shining in their minds." Faith is not mere well-wishing, or wishful thinking, nor some cheerful energy pumped up by the power of positive thinking. It is neither the product of brainpower nor the creation of imagination, but here is an imaginative way of picturing it from Gibran: "Faith is an oasis in the heart which will never be reached by the caravan of thinking."

We like to think we are objective about reality. We believe every puzzle is ultimately understandable, every mystery dissolvable in the acid of thought. If it's real and if it's important, it can be dissected, described, reformulated, and commercialized. But that's not the way faith works. Faith is a mystery as to where it comes from, how it works in us, and how it grows or why it shrinks. Where does it reside? Erich Fromm suggested that, "Faith is a character trait pervading the whole personality rather than a specific belief." That is, it's not just an idea cozily snug in the head, but a field of energy in the muscles and glands and viscera.

We tend to speak of faith as some sort of pose of self-assurance that gets us over life's humps. In thinking this way, we make faith a quality of our will tackling rough terrain. But I have come to accept that faith is not of my creation, but a transcendent quality over which I have very little control, but with which my own strength can cooperate. Faith, I have discovered, is a kind of resident alien within, enabling me to discover meaning in the events of my life even when the events of my life have taken an apparently meaningless direction. I have discovered that faith is an energy not of my making that – despite unplanned twists and turns, egregious errors and accidental triumphs – enables me to cautiously peer around the next bend knowing that I am not in control of the trip. I have discovered that faith is less like what I would call confidence and more like what I have to term amazement, which is another way of saying that faith has more to do with accepting life as it goes than creating it according to our favorite blueprint.

Faith is not assent to doctrine. Faith is not a guarantee of bliss. Faith is not something that can be quantified anyway, and Jesus was pretty clear that a mustard seed-sized faith was plenty ample to do amazing feats. How much faith is necessary to be a follower of Jesus? Minuscule portions, it seems. In Jesus' understanding of faith, there is possibility even for us, the unqualified, the underfaithed, the doubting believers, the anxious hopers, those of the questioning countenance, to join with others in what is invitingly called The Way.




